

SEWELL CUP IS 'A' CATBOAT PRIZE

Oldest of Bay Trophies Being
Sailed For In Today's
Races.

GENERAL GAVE CUP
TO CLUB 31 YEARS AGO

SEASIDE PARK, Aug. 8.—The Sewell cup, among the oldest of bay trophies, is being sailed for here today by Class "A" catboats. The Wolstenholme trophy is the award sought by sloop skippers who are sailing over the local club course in the regular Saturday races sponsored by the Barnegat Bay Yacht Racing association.

Last night the Sewell cup dance at the yacht club, an annual affair, inaugurated the racing weekend, one of the most popular of the summer season.

The Sewell cup was donated July 20, 1900 to the Seaside Park Yacht club by William J. Sewell, one-time member of the club. The cup is a perpetual trophy which the trustees of the yacht club decided should be sailed for by the catboats. The trophy has been sailed for every year since it was first put up.

The not so old, the Wolstenholme trophy sailed for by Class "E" sloops is equally interesting. The cup was donated by the late Robert Wolstenholme, one time commodore of the club. It is a replica of a Spanish galleon worked in sterling silver. This too is a perpetual trophy and was first sailed for in 1925.

Other classes including the two sneak-box classes, "A" and "B" catboats and 18 foot cats are also scheduled to compete.
