Why a Sandpiper?

At the end of last season I had a conversation with one of the top skippers at Metedeconk River Yacht Club, a champion scow sailor. He was curious why I was racing a Sandpiper instead of one of the hotter, performance classes. I said that the enjoyment of racing Sandpipers is the very fact that they are low tech. There are very few controls to adjust. Once you learn the few simple tricks to setting up the boat, you just go out and sail. Racing Sandpipers is about strategy, tactics, and boat handling far more than tuning. It's what makes them so fun, I explained. To my surprise he agreed, saying, "Nothing is less fun than racing the type of one-design where the skipper of the boat that beats you tells you that he won because 'he tightened his lower shrouds a quarter turn'".

Now, I'll be the first to admit that there is a part of me that enjoys tuning up a racing sailboat, but there is only so much time you can devote to

The History of the Sandpiper

Following the successes of the 18 foot Sanderling and the Marshall 22 in the early 1960's, Breck Marshall decided to add a smaller half-decked catboat to the fleet in 1972. He shortened the Sanderling hull lines proportionally and the result became known as the Sandpiper. The idea was to provide a smaller daysailer which was easier to single-hand and maintain, yet provide better performance than the Beetle Cat which was well established as the local fleet for daysailers and racers of all ages.

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fiddling with your boat. Sandpipers provide the perfect blend of trim and tactics. As an added bonus they are beautiful little yachts, perfectly suited to our shallow waters. Apparently many people agree, as our fleet continues to grow rapidly. You may be surprised to see on page 3 that our fleet now numbers 51 boats.

Oh yes, those few simple tricks to setting up a Sandpiper? Mast raked slightly forward, forestay loose, board full down upwind, outhauls just snug, give her lots of sheet—but you knew all that. See you on the water!

In the fall of 1972, with the boat not very rigorously tested, the Sandpiper was chosen as the "mystery boat" for the North American Inter-Class Solo Championships, which was being held at Barrington, Rhode Island. This three day invitational regatta featured ten of the best sailors in the country, including Gary Jobson, Robbie Doyle and Ted Turner. The type of boat for the first and third day was announced to the racers months before the regatta (Laser and Sunfish), but the boat for the second day, the "mystery boat"

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BBYRA Innovations for 2005

Responding to requests from the various classes, the BBYRA has delivered a revamped schedule and changes that should make for a highly interesting and competitive year Down Bay. Kudos to the Regatta and Class Liaison Committees, chaired by Bill Scheyer and Bob Morrow, respectively, for being responsive to the competitors requests. We have a 12 race schedule with all double race days with the exception of BHYC/MCYC and SPYC. The Sandpipers will now be the last morning class to start, based on speed ratings.

The following changes were recently posted on the BBYRA webpage by Sailing Instructions Chairman Jim Carson:

- Skipper (person in charge) need not be the helmsman but must be on board. (SI 5.1)
- Daily entries will be scored. (Racing Rule C5)
- Time to Warning Signal after onshore postponement reduced. (SI 4.2)
- Changes in starting order. See schedule. (SI 6)
- Radio may be used by contestants to report DNS, DNF and emergencies. (SI 5.3, 10, 21)
- Radio may be used by Committee to hail OCS.
 (SI 10, 21)
- An Initial Mark (Green) may be used that is to be rounded to port prior to assuming the posted course. When used a green shape or flag will be displayed with the course. (SI 7.4)
- Offset Mark eliminated. (Portable Courses)
- Starting line exclusion retained but finish line

exclusion deleted. (SI 9.5)

- Courses 7 & 8 finish will be at a separate finish line, not the leeward mark. (SI 26)
- Time limit reduced to two hours. Boats finishing more than 20 minutes after first boat will be DNF. (SI 12.1)
- No morning race will have a Warning Signal after 11:30. (SI 12.2)
- No afternoon race will have a Warning Signal after 3:30. (SI 12.2)
- Penalties will be one turn instead of two. (SI 14.1)
- Failed inspection will be DSQ instead of DNE. (SI 14.4)

With all those double race days and shorter, more competitive courses, we should attract even bigger fleets than last year. Could this be the year we get 20 Sandpipers on the starting line? We'll find out soon.◆

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was not revealed until that morning. There was some grumbling amongst the skippers that it was not a performance racing dinghy, but the playing field was even.


After a few late nights, ten boats were built for the regatta. I've been told that the varnish on some of them air dried as they were towed via water to Barrington. As luck would have it, a typical New England Sou'wester rolled in with the wind piping up to 30 plus knots. The race was held anyway and the result was ten fierce competitors truly putting these boats to the test. Other than a few hardware failures, the boats proved that they could take some punishment. The exposure this regatta provided was a great boost and as a result orders started coming in.

Most of the new boats were being sold to individuals looking for a stable, simple daysailer. A cuddy version of the Sandpiper was first offered in 1976. In 1977, Universal Studios purchased two Sandpipers for the filming of JAWS II. This certainly gave the boat more exposure, even though the boats were not treated very well by the shark.

In the 1980's some racing fleets began to develop. A number of Sandpipers were sold to Duxbury, Massachusetts in the late 1980's and this fleet is still going strong today with 10 to 12 boats consistently showing up on a starting line. There is also a very active class of 15 to 20 Sandpipers in Useppa Island on the west coast of Florida. This fleet has seen a very rapid growth since the mid 1990's.

Barnegat Bay certainly hosts the largest concentration of Sandpipers in one area, with almost 50 boats in the various clubs. While the Sandpipers have been sailing and racing on the Bay since the mid 1980's they officially became a BBYRA class in 1994. With the hard work of this organization the class is still growing today.

Sandpipers can be found from Canada to the Bahamas and all across the United States. The shop in South Dartmouth, Massachusetts is still building an average of 10 new Sandpipers and refurbishing two or three of the older ones per year. We molded hull number 525 this winter. We are always happy to help Sandpiper owners by answering questions or sending parts to keep their boats in good shape and make sure they are accomplishing the most important aspect of Sandpiper sailing. Having fun!
